What is LAMDA?

LAMDA stands for London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art. Completing a LAMDA programme is the speech and drama equivalent of a music grade.

Why LAMDA?

LAMDA is an amazing way to develop self-confidence, physical presence, and a strong speaking voice.

The LAMDA programme is used to improve the following skills:

- to read easily, fluently and with good understanding
- to expand vocabulary to improve powers of self-expression
- to improve confidence in speaking and listening
- to memorise and recall information
- to research and create persuasive formal presentations
- to create and defend positive discussion
- to engage in constructive informal conversation
- to build skills in working both independently or cohesively as part of a team.

How does LAMDA work at Hobletts Manor Junior School?

- If you wish to sign up 30 minute group lessons (groups are max 6 students) will be scheduled on Friday afternoons so that curriculum lessons are not missed by participants. Lessons will occur within the normal school hours, just the same as taking Guitar or musical instrument lessons.
- There are 10 lessons per term.

What do the lessons involve:

- Drama warm up.
- Drama games to improve skills and technique.
- LAMDA training following the LAMDA programme with a view to take one LAMDA grade per academic year (however this element is optional).

Pricing:
